## **Dumped on Valentine's Day**

In my first few months of being sober, I didn't believe the dating suggestions applied to me. I was seeing another AA member, and you could say we were on a pink cloud. I didn't realize it at the time, but I was using men as my Higher Power. I thought as long as the two of us were staying sober together, I would be OK.



About three months after we started dating, he had to move away to go to school, so I visited him on weekends. I soon got pregnant, and things started to get rocky. He began to come off his pink cloud and felt his old habits coming back. So he did what the program suggests and got a sponsor and started working the Steps.

I began to get jealous. I wanted all his attention. When he chose Step work over me, I got resentful. I began to start acting out and wanting control. When that didn't work, it left me feeling alone, scared, unwanted and resentful. So I gave him an ultimatum. But he chose to work his Steps and find himself.

On Valentine's eve, he called and told me it was over. Now it was Valentine's Day, and I was pregnant—and dumped—by a recovering alcoholic. I felt I had a justifiable resentment. This led to an emotional rock bottom. I wanted to die. And since I had not gotten "in the middle" of AA, I felt I had nowhere to turn.

Then one night, while lying in bed and picturing putting a gun to my head, I asked for help. I prayed for God's will. I admitted to whatever could be out there that I had once again screwed everything up and couldn't go on anymore. Just then, a feeling of warmth surrounded me like arms holding my body. I felt willing to reach out to other members.

Right away I got in the middle of AA. I started calling my sponsor and working the Steps. I also started going on AA road trips. My sister got sober, and I was able to reach out to her too. My attitude and outlook changed. I learned to forgive and see my part in things. As my sponsor always says, I got to "see the lesson."

Nine months later, our baby was born. Both of us were still sober and continued working our own programs. We learned how to communicate, and about three months after the birth, we reconciled peacefully—all thanks to AA. We are both sober and happy today. Things are better than I could ever have planned, and when times are tough, we have our own Higher Powers and our own programs. The Promises are all coming true.

## **Honesty**

Life wasn't going well for me when I showed upon the scene, but I was ready for the change, whatever that would mean.

My wife asked me a question while trying on some jeans: Did they make her look extended? Well, you know what I mean.

That put me in a quandary and, I knew I had to lie, If life has to be that rigorous, well, I guess I'm gonna die.

I told a friend about it and he said "you got it right." *Kindness* trumps the *rigorous* clause, and you gotta keep it light.

He gave a definition and for our purpose, I believe, kind honesty is devoid of all motives to deceive.

It gives a little wiggle room and, I think God wouldn't mind, if self-righteousness takes a little hit, if only to be kind.

I've learned there are few absolutes, and my conscience is my Guide, and I must put self-honesty first when *these thing I decide*. *By* Rick R., Poway, CA

## Behind the Scenes: That meeting book in his hand did not magically appear

As my life got increasingly unmanageable during the last years of drinking, I withdrew more and more and became isolated from meaningful interactions with others. That this was happening in midtown Manhattan made life all the more lonely. So it was with amazement that in early sobriety I discovered AA's meeting book for our greater metropolitan area.

While it was as confusing as a train schedule at first, I was like a kid with a new-found toy, running around town to meetings in a great many unlikely places at all hours of the day and night. Here was a listing that said a particular sort of AA meeting would be held at a certain time and place, and behold, there it was—and run by drunks that I would guess hadn't always been reliable for keeping commitments. This world was a radically different place from where I'd so recently lived and drunk. A whole different set of principles were guiding these mostly sober folks who, while they seemed pretty laid back and casual, were well enough organized to be there when the meeting book said they would be.

A couple years later when doing a weekly stint as a telephone answering volunteer at our intergroup office, I was able to see how the information was gathered, updated and regularly published. The meeting lists hadn't just happened miraculously. They were the result of well-organized effort and just plain hard work. At last I came to understand that while AA itself must never be organized, there were some jobs in AA that need to be well-planned.

As a member of our general service area, I found myself working on the planning committee for our annual area convention, and saw how AA members find strength in getting together to enjoy the broadest community aspects of our Fellowship. So our convention has become an annual custom that provides much joy in living and sharing. It needs a lot of careful planning and organizing to make it happen and to provide for the needs of an unbelievably diverse range of tastes, spirits and temperaments. The going was not always as smooth as we planned as we did the necessary tasks, but the results were beyond our wildest dreams. And we all stayed sober right through the Sunday morning meeting that closed the event. We had created a committee directly responsible to those who need our services. —Boyce B., Brooklyn, N.Y.

### The Origin of our Serenity Prayer (from www.AAhistory.com)

In 1942, a New York AA member named Jack brought to everyone's attention a caption in a routine New York Herald Tributary obituary that showed the Serenity Prayer that we in AA now say. Bill W. then wrote in A.A. Comes of Age, "With amazing speed, the Serenity Prayer came into general use and took its place alongside our two other favorites, the Lord's Prayer and the Prayer of St. Francis."

Thus did the "accidental" noticing of an unattributed prayer, printed alongside a simple obituary of an unknown individual open the way toward the prayer's daily use by thousands upon thousands of A.A.s worldwide.

Today, there is still a question about where this prayer originated from. Some say it was originally called the 'General's Prayer" dating back to the 14<sup>th</sup> century. Another source says it dates back to the Roman philosopher Boethius (480-524 A.D.) or more recently, to the theologian Dr. Rheinhold Niebuhr, who claimed he wrote it. Here is a long version of the Prayer, one of many versions that Dr. Niebuhr is said to have written:

God grant me the SERENITY to accept the things I cannot change;

COURAGE to change the things I can;

And WISDOM to know the difference.

Living one day at a time; enjoying one moment of time; accepting hardships as the pathway to peace; Taking, as HE did, this sinful world as it is, not as I would have it:

Trusting that HE will make all things right if I surrender to His WILL;

That I may be reasonably happy in this life

and supremely happy with Him forever in the next. Amen.
